After School Work Centre (for students in years 9 to years 13)

From Monday 29th of July, we will be resurrecting our After School Work Centre. The centre will operate after school from 3.15pm to 5.00pm on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays (for the time being). Depending on need it may be extended to include Fridays too. We will monitor how things progress during term 3.

The purpose of the centre is to give students the opportunity to work here at school alongside a teacher, and to utilise the schools resources to help them satisfactorily complete their homework and study. Particularly, those students who continually fail to complete homework, assessments and tasks during the school week.

Too often students have said they could not do their work because there was no-one to help or they didn't have the computers/books/resources at hand, to finish their work. It is envisaged the centre will achieve our goals in assisting students to complete their homework and to also help develop great study habits and research skills. These skills are so very important for secondary studies and NCEA.

Finally, the centre will also be for students who need time and space to reflect on their behaviour and attitude, which is causing issues while at school. Consequences for responding inappropriately and not adhering to our kaupapa and mātāpono will be reiterated and a shared learning of these in our centre.

<u>Parents will be given 3 days notice their son/daughter will be attending the centre</u>. As parents/guardians your responsibility will be to ensure your son/daughter attends and to uplift them at 5pm each day the centre is open.

Te Tupua

Te Tupua will be performed here on Wednesday 31 July at 1pm. Te Tupua is a one man solo performance by John Davies (actor, writer, director). Te Tupua — The Goblin is all the more powerful because it is a story about one of Davies' own ancestors. The travails of the 10-year old Scottish lad are drawn from history but are not a factual recounting of his enslavement in the early 1800s and 15 years aboard a British ship. His fight for survival after he is cast ashore on Aotearoa is not merely told but fully enacted.

John G Davies is a consummate storyteller. Not only powerful play, and he performs all 13 characters in it. He gives each character its own voice, becoming Scottish or Māori, male or female, cowering or commanding – even his stature morphs from tall to small and tall again. Stories are how we understand our world, our culture, ourselves.
